National Clearinghouse for English Language. This site gives information dealing with 1. Theories and approaches to curriculum development and implementation, 2. Methods and materials for use in the classroom. It contains resources designed for helping linguistically and culturally diverse learners reach challenging academic standards in early childhood and K-12 programs. There were specific resources categorized by subject(math, science, history,etc). The highest level of math that I found was Pre-Algebra. <u>Dave Sperling's ESL Cafe</u> has resources for EL teachers (classroom activities in a variety of categories submitted by teachers, job-posting boards and forums and EL students (subject quizzes, definitions for English idioms, hints for understanding and learning English, and the means to ask questions of qualified teachers). This very nice site includes a photo-gallery, a list of memorable quotes, a "Today inHistory" page. This site lists links related to teaching English in general. It includes AP and IB, critical thinking, literature, poetry, etc. Once section of the site has a list of sites directed at ESL/TRESOL/ELL> Each of the 40-50 links has a short but helpful description of what is at the site. Though the ESL section is not as extensive as on some other sites, the annotations would help a teacher decide quickly whether a site would be appropriate for the issue at hand.

**This ESL Lab** is a place where you can go and listen to spoken clips in English. Some clips are short, some longer, on various topics. There are questions about the clips. You can have students use this independently, ideally. Then they could maybe print out their answers to the questions and turn them in. Self-description:

The lab is mainly designed for self-directed study, that is, you choose what topic and level you want to study and then begin. Teachers can also use it as part of their classes. You don't have to log-in, and you don't need to subscribe to use the listening lab. The listening lab is free to use online. www.esl-lab.com/

English Grammar Quizzes is helpful to students learning English. Even young English speakers in primary grades could benefit from the activities.
