WHAT IS THE OCAD PROGRAM?

Orange County Academic Decathlon (OCAD) is a highly spirited, rigorous academic competition that is uniquely designed to provide high school students of all achievement levels the opportunity to compete as team members in a series of ten (10) academic tests and demonstrations. All public and private high schools are eligible to compete.

Founded in 1968 by former County Superintendent of Schools Robert Peterson, Ed.D., OCAD serves as the model for all the prestigious Academic Decathlon events that now exist at the state and national levels.

WHY PARTICIPATE IN THE OCAD PROGRAM?

The program engages students of all achievement levels in a variety of challenging academic events. Under the guidance of an adult coach, OCAD challenges students to demonstrate a mastery of higher-order thinking skills, written aptitude, and communication skills in the following subjects: **art, economics, literature, math, music, science, social science, interview, speech, and essay.**

The mission of the Orange County Academic Decathlon is to inspire academic excellence and build 21st century skills that prepare students for college and careers.

OCAD contributes to a Multi-Tiered System of Support and Local Control and Accountability Plan priorities by building academic and social-emotional skills, engaging students, families and community members, and fostering school connectedness.

The competition culminates with an exciting Super Quiz relay, a team event where parents, faculty, and classmates cheer for their teams from the sidelines, championing academics much like the environment of a sporting event.

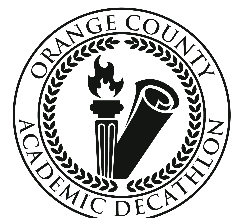
Students who participate report improvement in the areas of communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and character, and they report feeling a stronger sense of belonging at school.

Student Outcomes

Survey results from students who participated in the 2024-2025 Academic Decathlon:

- **91%** reported that the program improved skills in **critical thinking**
- **95%** reported that the program improved skills in **communication**
- **83%** reported that the program improved skills in **team-work**
- **92%** reported the development of **stronger character traits**
- **93%** reported that the program helped them to **build relationships with their peers**
- **83%** reported that the program helped them **feel more connected to their school**

HOW DO SCHOOLS PARTICIPATE?

Each participating school must have a faculty representative to serve as a coach. As OCAD is a multidisciplinary program, having an assistant coach is beneficial. Students in grades 9-12 are eligible to participate in the Academic Decathlon.

Registration and Participation Fees

A school must have an Intent to Participate form on file with the Orange County Department of Education Academic Events office. All registration materials must be received by **November 12, 2025**. Participation fees for the 2025-2026 school year are \$695 for the first six to nine students and \$100 for each additional student beyond nine, or for each student if registering less than six. Payment must be received by **December 15, 2025**. Checks or purchase orders are accepted.

Schools must purchase the curriculum materials separately from the [United States Academic Decathlon website](https://www.usadecathlon.org/).

HOW ARE TEAMS FORMED?

Academic Decathlon teams consist of nine (9) student members, known as Decathletes. A team consists of three (3) Decathletes in each of the following Grade Point Average (GPA) categories:

<i>Honors</i>	<i>(GPA 3.90 – 4.0)</i>
<i>Scholastic</i>	<i>(GPA 3.4 – 3.89)</i>
<i>Varsity</i>	<i>(GPA 0.0 – 3.39)</i>

The OCAD guidelines for student eligibility and Grade Point Average (GPA) computation are defined by the California Academic Decathlon and the United States Academic Decathlon. For students in grades 10-12, the unweighted cumulative grade point average listed on their official high school transcript will determine placement in one of the above GPA categories. Students in grade 9 are considered “wildcards” and may compete in any of the above GPA categories. Schools are welcome and encouraged to recruit more than nine students to participate in the program.

HOW ARE TEAMS RECOGNIZED?

Team Awards

A school competes in one of three competition divisions. Team awards are presented to the top five Super Quiz teams and top five overall teams in each division. The team awarded first place in the Orange County Academic Decathlon will represent the county at the California Academic Decathlon on March 19-22, 2026. Additional top-scoring teams may be invited to the state competition, depending on statewide overall team scores. Historically, Orange County has sent two to ten teams to the state competition.



Individual Awards

For each competition division, medals are presented to the top five Decathletes in each GPA category for each subject area. The highest overall individual scoring Decathletes also receive medals. Educational scholarships up to \$1,000 are awarded to top overall individual winners.
