Requisites to attend: Please send a resume and proof of language proficiency OR a copy of a diploma from an accredited 4-year, educational institution from your home country to Stephanie Rock at srock@ocde.us
Eligibility: Applicants should have a high school diploma, interpreting experience, and proof of language proficiency.
Note: To receive your certificate, you must complete 40 hours of in-person training OR make up for your missed hours at a different date (requires prior approval by the trainer). Also includes a 90-minute written test and certificate.
Audience: Bilingual staff and contract interpreters in healthcare, education, social services, and community services e.g., hospitals and health departments, K-12 schools, family planning, domestic violence, housing, senior centers, law enforcement, etc.



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THE PROGRAM

The Community Interpreter is a comprehensive 40-hour certificate program. It provides the prerequisite for national medical interpreting certification. Cross Cultural Communication's (CCC) program, The Community Interpreter (R), is taught across the country and is the leading national program for interpreter training.
