# 2005 CSBA Conference Notes

Several board members from Orange County who attended the recent CSBA conference in San Diego, have submitted their impressions and some information that they have consented to share.

### **Delegate Assembly:**

\* Rick Pratt informed us that "Preschool for All" proposition will be discussed at the May Delegation Assembly. Delegates will then determine if CSBA will take a position. This initiative will be on the June ballot and is endorsed by Jack O'Connell. (Sharon Wallin, Irvine Unified School District)

\* CSBA is the perfect lead agency to attack the issue of Adequate School Funding, something that our state leaders seem unwilling or afraid to address. Partnered with the League of Woman Voters, CSBA has received a \$500,000 grant to spread the word of adequacy around the state and find major supporters for the ultimate study that is being done. CSBA hoped to address the issue several years ago with the establishment of in-house Finance Institute and the hiring of an expert in the field. Issues of school facilities sidetracked the effort. The timing is now perfect to move ahead. (Marilyn Buchi, Fullerton Joint Union High School District)

\* In his report to Delegate Assembly, Scott Plotkin related a conversation he had with a lobbyist (or reporter) who asked who had given the Governor's Office input in designing the disastrous education initiatives on the November 2005 ballot. Scott replied that no one from the Education Coalition had been consulted at all, which amazed the lobbyist (or reporter). (Sheila Benecke, Capistrano Unified School District)

## **General Assembly Speakers:**

\* I was most impressed with the keynote speakers at the General Assemblies. I was both inspired and informed! I now want to study cultural anthropology and go on to fix the State--just give me the chance. Hearing that computers were intuitive for the children, while they are learned procedures for us oldsters, was mind-boggling. Our lives are changing at such a fast pace that we can't keep up and we start to feel disenfranchised. I knew this on the subconscious level, but it was good to hear it spoken. (Meg Cutuli, Los Alamitos Unified School District)

\* The idea with the greatest impression on me came from the first two general sessions. The concept and its development of the new digital language of high tech communications and information storage and processing will revolutionize the way people think, interact, learn, and will totally change the relationship and communication between nations. This will dramatically change the education requirements and approaches across the globe. These ideas were very powerful and convincing and I believe we owe it to ourselves and our constituents to better understand these ideas so we can intelligently address how to evolve our educational delivery system to keep American youngsters at the highest competitive levels. \* At the State of the State session, the audience rose in long applause to thank Ken Hall for his years of service to education and to CSBA. This was the last CSBA conference he will attend as a partner in School Services of California as he will be retiring soon. He spoke of nine points boards should remember as they negotiate, but the one he stressed is that "No" is a legal and often appropriate response to a negotiation demand. Boards should not be afraid to use the word. All three speakers, including Scott Plotkin, Rick Pratt, and Ken Hall, indicated that the attitude we must communicate in dealings with the Governor's Office after his serious trouncing at the polls, is one of graciousness and cooperative effort. ## Workshops and Critical Issues:

\* In "Putting Money Where It Matters" workshop with Bob Blattner, Bob stressed that to maximize categorical dollars we need to become more innovative and think further outside the box. (Suzie Swartz, Saddleback Valley Unified School District)

\* In "Program Improvement: From Watch List to Restructuring," Rialto USD Superintendent Edna Herring related their experience as a Program Improvement District. Interestingly, she reported that the experience essentially has been a great benefit to the district, motivating everyone to analyze testing and student scores, to rethink what and how they teach, and to encourage renewal, staff development, and revision. (Sheila Beneke, Capistrano Unified School District)

\* In "How to Survive Declining Enrollment," Santee District described what they went through, the cuts made, and suggestions to keep up morale when they lost 1,900 students in a five to six-year period. They went from approximately 8,800 to 6,900.

\* The session "Improving Achievement for Low-Income Students: What Makes a Difference?" described a research project that studied polices and practices in comparing districts that serve low-income students. They found that parent involvement only made a difference if it was connected to the curriculum and teaching. Most important was having the principal clearly state the vision and expectations that enable the teachers to take responsibility to develop well-defined plans correlated with API/AYP goals. Curriculum has to be aligned grade-wise with the district providing ELA standards. The principal should be evaluated upon how well the students achieve on multiple sources of assessment. (Mary Fuhrman, Buena Park School District)


