## PANDEMIC PLANNING

Almost daily, we hear about the outbreak of avian/bird flu and how it is spreading around the world. At this time, bird flu is circulating in many countries. The virus (H5N1) is found mostly in birds; however, some human cases have been reported. These cases are the result of human contact with sick birds, not human to human transmission. Migratory birds can carry the virus around the world but show no symptoms. The bird flu is not in the United States now. When cases of flu in birds are



identified in the US, there may be confusion and concern, even though there is no conclusive evidence that the virus is spread from birds to humans. At some point, whether it is the H5N1 virus or another virus, health experts believe that there will eventually be a virus that spreads from human to human for which most people have no immunity and for which we have no vaccine. Officials cannot determine if, when, or where a pandemic will strike. If a pandemic flu spreads, officials may recommend "social distancing" or "social isolation," the consequence of which could be the closing of schools for an extended period of time.

Why should schools plan now? According to the U.S. Department of Education, approximately 20% of the US population attends or works in schools. Because viruses can live on surfaces for two hours or more, schools happen to be very good places for germs to spread. Historically, much of the spread of past flu pandemics occurred in schools. Everyone should know ways to keep from getting sick:

- Cover the nose and mouth when sneezing or coughing.
- Throw tissues away after use.
- Wash hands often using soap and water. If water is not near, use an alcohol-based hand cleaner.
- Avoid touching your nose, eyes, and mouth.

Illness spreads quickly in a school setting. Include these actions in your training materials:

- Instruct school staff about how and when to report illnesses to the local health agency.
- Encourage employees who are sick to stay home.
- Remind parents and caregivers to keep sick children home and provide more specificity when reporting their child's illness.


